Water Friendly Plant List



Vines

Common Name / Scientific Name	Light	Comments
Carolina Jessamine / <i>Gelsemium sempervirens</i>	Sun/part shade	Evergreen compact bushy growth with yellow flowers.
Confederate Jasmine / <i>Trachelospermum jasminoides</i>	Sun/part shade	Evergreen with wonderful white small fragrant flowers resembling a pinwheel.
Coral Honeysuckle / <i>Lonicera sempervirens</i>	Sun/part shade	Native evergreen with showy bright orange to scarlet tubular flowers and bright red berries.
Coral Vine or Queen's Wreath / <i>Antigonon leptopus</i>	Sun	Fast-growing, tolerates poor soil. Rose-pink flowers that drape up and down foliage.
Crossvine / <i>Bignonia capreolata</i>	Sun/part shade	Native evergreen, orange-red tubular flowers. Can grow to 30 feet, easily attaches to surfaces.
Fig Ivy / <i>Ficus pumila</i>	Sun/part shade	Evergreen. Small, heart-shaped dull-green leaves. Can be used as a ground cover.
Lady Banksia / <i>Rosa banksia</i>	Sun	Strong growing rose, blooms yellow or white in spring. Provides dense screening.
Mexican Flame Vine / <i>Senecio confusus</i>	Sun	Brilliant orange tubular flowers. Adds spectacular color to landscape.
Passionflower / <i>Passiflora incarnata</i>	Sun/part shade	Native that is grown for its unusual exotic blooms that range in colors.
Sky Blue Vine / <i>Thunbergia grandiflora</i>	Sun	Lush green heart shaped leaves with sky blue drooping flowers. Can reach 20 feet.
Trumpet Vine / <i>Campsis radicans</i>	Sun/part shade	Native, very showy. Long orange-red tubular flowers followed by bean-like seed pods.
Virginia Creeper / <i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i>	Sun/ shade	Native fast-growing vine that tolerates shade. Blue-black berries in the fall.
